Youth Council Overview





Youth Council Overview

The Alexandria City Youth Council started as a pilot program three years ago as an opportunity for students to engage in the community, leadership, and philanthropy.

Since then we've had several Discovery Projects, helped organize Spring2ACTion, and organized a grantmaking project!

The Discovery Project gives a voice to the youth to speak on issues that we face. Spring2ACTion allowed us a greater opportunity to engage the community in giving and supporting local efforts. Grantmaking helped support local nonprofits centered around important youth issues.





Recruitment

This Year's Recruitment Process:

- Hosted an Interest Meeting
- Collected applications from Alexandria youth
- Conducted interviews
- Reviewed applications anonymously
- Followed up via email

New Member Criteria:

- Be a high school student who is a resident of Alexandria (City of/Alexandria Fairfax County)
- Currently in 9th-11th grade
- Must be able to commit 10 hours per month


The Design Process

Rationale

The Youth Council noticed the prevalence of substance abuse within the youth of Alexandria and the impact it has on our community. We wanted to raise awareness and address the dangers/consequences of substance abuse to help our youth lead healthier lives.

We wanted to take some time to inform others of preventative measures, methods of intervention, and resources for treatment/recovery.



Overview: 5 Whys



Why is there increased marijuana use in schools?

There is increased access to Marijuana for youth.

Why is there increased access to marijuana for youth?

Marijuana is more readily available due to less restrictive laws

Why are marijuana laws becoming less restrictive?

Legalization among state laws have been increasing

Why is marijuana being legalized in more places?

People are shifting to a more accepting viewpoint about Marijuana use

Why has public opinion shifted toward supporting legalization?

- Coping Mechanisms/ Mental health
 - Youth need better coping mechanisms



What is Substance Abuse?



Definition of Substance Abuse: Excessive use of psychoactive drugs, such as alcohol, pain medications, or illegal drugs. It can lead to physical, social, or emotional harm.

Nicotine: A natural, highly addictive chemical compound found in tobacco plants. It is the main ingredient in cigarettes and electronic cigarettes (vapes).

E-cigarettes (vapes): Battery operated devices that heat a liquid typically containing nicotine and artificial flavors which creates an aerosol.

Vaping is the action of inhaling the aerosol

Marijuana (Cannabis): A psychoactive drug that comes from the dried leaves and flowers of the cannabis plant. It contains the THC compound which is responsible for the intoxicating effects.



Age Demographics



Alexandria:

9% of 8th graders, 11% of 10th graders, and 19% of 12th graders reported regularly using marijuana.

6% of 8th graders, 11% of 10th graders, and 13% of 12th graders reported regularly using e-cigarettes.


General:

- Males are more likely to use nicotine products than Females (20% men and 14% women in the United States)
- The majority of smokers begin before the age of 18

Why Do Teens Do Drugs?

- Enjoyment
- Coping Mechanism
 - o i.e, stress, life, depression, mental health
- Social Acceptance
- Boredom

It is estimated that over <u>30%</u> of marajuana users use to cope with depression.



- Healthy coping mechanisms lessen adverse mental health challenges
- Common coping mechanisms include social support, connecting with spirituality, and exercising

Why Healthcare?

- Healthcare is a basic human need that everyone deserves, but doesn't have access to
- There are still major factors in Alexandria that contribute to this inequity
- We wanted to explore how our city can improve on making healthcare accessible to everyone





Our 5 Whys

Presenting Questions: Why Doesn't Our Community Know About Resources?

- 1. Community does not know where to find information
- 2. Lack of connection between city officials and individuals in need of these resources
- City website is hard to navigate
- 4. Not prioritized because there is not enough advocacy

Healthcare Statistics





Healthcare Statistics

- Age has been one of the greatest factors when looking at who can access healthcare: Older adults in Virginia had higher rates of routine check ups than the national average (2022).
- Language Barriers: 31.9% of Alexandria City Residents speak a language other than English-double the state average.
- Race & Insurance: Most uninsured Virginians were White non-Hispanic (37.8%), followed by Hispanic (30.5%), Black (19.0%), Asian/Pacific Islander (6.3%) and multuracial (6.4%). Hispanic virginians were uninsured at higher rates at 21.2%.
- Avoidable deaths due to lack of insurance and resources: two out of three premature deaths in Alexandria City were avoidable.


Ways to Find Information



Alexandria City Health Department

- Has both a Facebook and Instagram account
- Posts include educational messages, community opportunities, and health related statistics in Alexandria
- Almost completely in english
- Not much engagement:
 - Instagram: >300 followers, about 10-20 likes per post
 - > Facebook: 170 followers, 1-5 likes per post

Neighborhood Health

- Has an Instagram account and website
- Instagram has over 2000 posts and over 1300 followers
- Instagram is mostly english, but website is translatable to many languages


According to their website, Neighborhood Health's mission is to improve health and advance health equity in Alexandria, Arlington, and Fairfax by providing high quality primary care regardless of ability to pay. They offer affordable primary care and pharmaceutical services, with 8 locations in Alexandria. In 2023-2024, they cared for over 42,000 patients and filled over 29,000 free/low cost prescriptions.

The City Website


- Only takes 2 clicks to reach healthcare information
- Translatable to many languages
- Most pages have been updated in the last year and the links are valid



The Teen Wellness Center is a program that provides no cost health care to all teens living in Alexandria. They have 2 locations at the Minnie Howard and King Street campuses of ACHS, and offer free physicals, immunizations, reproductive health services, and more.

Teen Wellness Center

- Does not have a social media; website connected to cities
- Outreach through community events and word of mouth
- Has a difficult time finding opportunities for outreach



Transportation Barriers



Transportation Barriers to Healthcare Access



Car Access:

- 50.2% of Alexandria residents drive alone, while 12.7% use public transportation as of 2023
- The median income for Alexandria is \$113,638 while the West End's median income is \$97,296, making it hard to afford a car.

Walking Distance:

- Neighborhood Health at Martha Custis Dr. is a 0.5–1 mile walk from nearby apartments short walk for local residents(DASH routes 36A,36B,103)
- Inova Alexandria Hospital can be a 56 minute walk away or 25 minute DASH transit for some Alexandrians.

DASH Bus System:

- Neighborhood Health at Mark Center is well connected via Route 35.
- Inova Cares in Mt.Vernon can be harder for people in Old Town to access via DASH

MetroAccess Paratransit

Eligibility is confirmed by appointment, it is not free (\$4.50 or less), use is
determined by closeness to Metro-accessible spots, and all rides are by
appointment only.





Challenges We Ran Into

- Limited data
- Outdated sources
- Calculating distance from clinics
- Understanding how free transit can impact healthcare access
- Lack of human impact data



Takeaways

- Accessible healthcare is more than a cost
- Age, race, insurance, or language can harm a person's ability to access healthcare
- While healthcare programs are available, a lack of usability and awareness prevents information from getting to those who need it

- There's a disconnect between in-person and digital outreach
- Physical distance increases healthcare inaccessibility for people without stable/personal transportation

Why Housing?



- Housing is a basic human need
- Housing is just like infrastructure
- Alexandria has a very competitive housing market
- We wanted to research ways that our city tries to combate this
- Find ways to help renting in Alexandria become increasingly affordable.

Housing Statistics





Overall Housing Stats

- 66% of people younger than 25 have either a Bachelor's degree or higher (combined)
- Bachelor's degree earn \$85k

- To rent a 1 bedroom apartment, need to make more than \$86,000
- Excluding people who even have a bachelor's degree

What can contribute to Housing Instability?

Unanticipated job changes, including loss of hours

Changes in family relationships, which can result in loss of income and/or housing

Changes in personal health conditions or the health of a family member

Poor housing conditions, which can impact health and result in loss of income

Unexpected new expenses (ex. loss of vehicle which impacts access to employment or childcare)

High costs and fees, including utility costs, condo fees, special assessments, and new fees

Annual rent increases that exceed annual increases in wages

Disabling conditions, which can limit job opportunities





Landlords

How do Landlords play a role in housing?

- set rental prices
- determining tenant selection criteria

How have recent events affected the rental market?

- In 2023, 60% couldn't afford a two-bedroom apartment
- Covid
- Increased competition for available units
- Housing Affordability Index lows







Housing Statistics- Unhoused People

653K

Across the United States from 2020 to now homelessness has risen by more than 150,000 people.

Why?The Housing Affordability index has plummeted.

Drop down menu:

- 1) Housing Choice Voucher Program
- 16-28 month wait period
- Almost 11,000 people on the waitlist
- 2) ARHA Public Housing
 - Income limits to 80% of AMI for low income and 50% of AMI for very low income
 - Almost 9,000 people on the waitlist
- 3) Department of Human and Community Services
 - Serves 40,000 Alexandria City residents annually
- 4) Virginia Homeless Solutions Program
- 5) HUD



- Two links brought up when asking "how to apply for low income housing in alexandria va"
- Contains job recruitment and opportunities
- Waitlist of 8,787 for Public Housing





Challenges We Ran Into

Lack of voices from lower income households

Difficulty finding family resources data

Data sometimes too specific (not equal)



Takeaways

- Most people who aren't able to afford housing, are employed but their incomes aren't able to keep up with rising prices
- The available options that are open to the public have aren't advertised enough
- Available options are very delayed with their services
- Most people who need affordable housing resources are the ones least likely to have access to the internet where the resources are
- Overwhelmed public housing assistance indicates a private market failure
