COVID Response Efforts

Protecting the health and welfare of our community was a top priority in 2021. ACT saw an opportunity to enlist community organizations as trusted messengers regarding the COVID vaccine and launched two grantmaking efforts focused on vaccine outreach and information dissemination.

To increase vaccination rates, the Alexandria Resilience Fund provided mini-grants and we formalized a grantmaking partnership with the Alexandria Health Department. Both programs leveraged the knowledge and onthe-ground relationships of Alexandria's nonprofits in order to reach residents who are not vaccinated.

SLEEVES UP, ALX: COVID-19 VACCINE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Sleeves Up, ALX is a collaboration with ACT for Alexandria and the Alexandria Health Department to provide S145,657 in grant funding to eight nonprofit organizations to assist with COVID-19 vaccine outreach initiatives and awareness building activities across communities in Alexandria.* Grantees created video peer testimonials, one-on-one outreach, and social media campaigns to address barriers and misinformation.

VACCINE MINI-GRANTS

Generous supporters to the Alexandria Resilience Fund enabled ACT to meet urgent community needs resulting from the pandemic. In February, we awarded \$46,110 in mini-grants to 16 community-based organizations to support outreach and information sharing regarding the COVID vaccine. Grantees reached approximately 20,000 Alexandrians through their efforts.

SERVICE NAVIGATION GRANTS

Many residents face significant barriers when accessing the programs and resources that will address the hardships brought on by the pandemic. ACT and the City of Alexandria launched a new pilot program: Service Navigation Grants. Grantees connected residents to eviction prevention services, food distribution, emergency financial assistance, and other state and federal programs.

ACT managed the grantee selection process and organized regular learning conversations to support alignment and collaboration. For example, during one meeting, grantees raised concerns about the mental health needs of residents. The City promptly responded by offering mental health first aid training for nonprofit staff and volunteers so that community partners could more easily identify needs and direct residents to supports.

This pilot informed a larger, more comprehensive program funded by the American Rescue Plan Act launching in 2022.

Promoting Economic

In the 1990s, Northern Virginia was recognized as a region where residents could successfully pursue the American dream, where families and their children could move up the economic ladder. However, economic success has largely depended on your neighborhood.(1) When COVID hit, poor and low-income families weathered a barrage of challenges – from lost income, to housing and food insecurity, to more deadly health outcomes. That's why ACT, in partnership with the City of Alexandria, donors, and nonprofit partners, took steps to support our neighbors hardest hit by the pandemic.

Fostering Learning

In 2021, ACT continued to work with our partners on innovative programs to invest in the resilience of low-income families as they secure greater financial stability and independence. The 2021 IMPACT Racial Equity Forum focused on a holistic approach to social and economic mobility, the damaging systems and narratives that perpetuate poverty, and the opportunities for poor and low-income people to shape new solutions.

Connecting to Resources

ACT received a grant from the Community Outreach and Opportunity Fund of the EITC Funders Network to work with community partners to educate residents about the benefits of the federal Child Tax Credit and the Earned Income Tax Credit. ACT worked with five local nonprofits on innovative outreach efforts to help Alexandrians access resources that would help their families achieve greater financial security. ACT provided mini-grants to: Community Lodgings, Concerned Citizens Network of Alexandria, Hopkins House, Dar Al-Hijrah Islamic Center, and Restoration Immigration Legal Aid.

Piloting New Solutions

ACT also worked closely with the City of Alexandria, the Bruhn-Morris Foundation, and community organizations to design a guaranteed income pilot program, ARISE, Alexandria's Recurring Income for Success and Equity. The program will launch in 2022 and provide 150 low-income households with S500 per month over a two-year period to help them ease the financial ups and downs and take steps to move up the economic ladder. ACT hosted convenings for more than 300 residents to learn about the program and shape its design.

Investing in Alexandria's Youth

YOUTH SUPPORT NETWORK

The U.S. Department of Education found that the COVID-19 pandemic had a tragic impact on youth and their families and deepened divides in educational opportunity. (2) The Youth Support Network was launched in 2020 to address what we knew. To be successful, Alexandria's youth need supportive programs and services.

We partnered with the Frank & Betty Wright Foundation, Alexandria City Public Schools, the City of Alexandria Parks & Recreation Department, youth-serving community organizations and other stakeholders to coordinate and align work across the city.

Caitlin Brown, the YSN Network Manager, met with 90 youth program providers to learn about their needs, challenges and opportunities for collaboration. This work culminated with a gathering of more than 60 youth-serving organizations to share hopes and ideas to move the network forward.

VISION & MISSION

Every youth in the City of Alexandria thrives, regardless of circumstances, through equitable access and engagement in high-quality and meaningful out-of-school time and community-based programs.

We foster collaboration and provide coordinated supports to a network of community organizations, government agencies, schools, and other partners dedicated to improving the equity, quality, and continuous innovation of youth-serving programs in the City of Alexandria.



Youth Council

ACT's Youth Council is a program designed by youth for youth with the purpose of providing decision-making power and funding to address key issues within the community. Ten local high school students were selected for the 2022 cohort.

In 2022 Council members will play a key role in Spring2ACTion and research issues in the community that are important to them.

ACT was selected by Citi Foundation as a recipient of the Community Progress Makers initiative, which supports visionary organizations across the U.S. that are working to connect low-income communities and communities of color to greater social and economic opportunity. As a Community Progress Maker, ACT will receive a multi-year, unrestricted grant of S500,000 and access to technical assistance and a supportive learning community from 2022 – 2023.
